Boise Ida. I5 Jul.

Dear Mom:

Just a note for now, doing fine. Our payroll has started today. We are in: Our picture will be in the Post. We found out we are headed for Fort Lewis in Washington. Our bus leaves to the Reilroad station (city bus that is) In I5 Min. Harold and I are in the Boise PostOffice. We stayed in the Idaho Hotel, the same one we stayed in for basketball last winter. Will be in Ft. Lewis at least IO days. Will let you hear from me again soon. as always Bernie.

Thur. I7 Jul. 1953

Dear Mom. Al.Lois. and all.

Well arrived in North Ft, Lewis to day Thur. Went all night from aBoise by train slept on a pullman ate supper on the train. Arrived here about 3 Oclock.

We saw a lot to day. We left Boise on the Portland Rose. changed trains at Portland, came to Tacama this morning. We saw tug boats and berges along most of the way and many large draw bridges, I guess that we saw some steemboats and some even larger. There were large lumber yards every since Nampa.

I'll send you my address, we'll probably be in Ft. Lewis about a week or so, you may get one letter to me before

I get moved from here.

We traveled in good style to here, Iwas surprised to find out what things are like, not as I expected. There are tw two groups in since we arrived. WE saw Ft. Lewis from the bus we went to North Ft. Lewis, a separate camp, so I may not see the fellows that I knew that were stationed at Ft. Lewis. However I may get away Sunday and if I can I will try to attend the L.D. S. services, Ithink they have them at Ft. Lewis, if thay ac I may see some of the fellows. The camps are really much larger than I supposed they would be. We'll get started on tests, lectures and other stuff tomorrow I guess. Ihope and pray that I may come out of these tests with a chance for acmething better than regular army. Love Bernie.

Dear Dad;
This army is really a boy scout organization if I ever saw one, everybody tries to pass the buck to everybody else. The Sargents give every one under them the devil, and it goes on down. We were given our clothes yesterday, A barrocks bag then told to strip down and donate our clothes tothe churches or put them in the bottom of the bag. They gave us a good fit on our shoes. I can't say that much slse fits except my hat, socks belt and tie.

Today is 18th I am in Sarvice center at North Ft. Lweis we've just had a floorshow. Clothes; they gave us two pairs of field boots, one of exfords, # of dress sex, 6 works sex 2 towels 2 belts, 2 ties, 2 work shirte, 2 work pants, 5 dress

pants and shirts, ½ doz. each of underclothes a rain coat and a jacket, 4 caps, a nocklas and we'll get tags with our names and serial number blood type. The Chaplain mentioned 3 groups of religion, Jewish, Catholic And Protestant, same L.D.S. fellows had an X on theirs.

I had a good time Monday night. Mary Ann got off so we went to Shelley to a good musical show, with Gordon McRae in

"Desert Song" it's beautiful in color.

I got up early and visited with Al and Lois. All of us went to the Armory in al's car and I left on the bus. You probably saw our picture in the Post, the four of us are still togather. I'm going to Church in the morning, there are plenty of guys who went be so the army wen't suffer for help. After the first day I got sort of used to sargents hollering.

Monday we will be given about 8 or 0 tests They are graded by machine so that we will know the score almost as soon as we are finished . There will be four months of basic, we then could apply for officers training, but looks to me like officers are married to the Army. Ihave never seen so many negroes, but they say there not many hape- none in my bar-

racks - some Indians here too.

Should an emergency arise the fastest and only way to get in touch with us is through the Red Cross, giving them our add.& serial number.

Week of July 23 1953

I must have done alright in tests today because I stayed with about ½ the group to take O.C.S. test, even if I had a chance I wouldN't take it because it means another year and the active reserve till one is 65. I went to Church. They can't keep you from attending Church. I think I have never heard a more inspiring Sacrament Service. J Earl, Olson and I we took Harold with us. I played a little ping pong and waited around till I:30 for Priestood Meeting. When I welked in was I ever surprised, I saw three fellows from Ricks, I went with them, after meeting, to their barracks until the 7 Oclock meeting. There are 3 or 4 fellows from Rexburg I sure enjoyed seeing them.

I enjoyed Sacrament Meeting. There was one fellow who talked, he and only been a member since last week, he was converted while bonking with a returned missionary, he was certainly glad to have met so many good L.D. &. Men and be baptized before shipping out. He has been through his four menths of basic. I felt better after going to Church. I'll let you know my changed address, that should be fairly per-

manent about I6 weeks of basic training.

We had ten tests this morning, reeding some, praticle math., and mechanics. We get a private interview tomorrow. We got our "dog tags" to day. And at church we filled out a slip and got our church books, the small copy of the Book of Mormon, Principles of the Gospel, and L.D.S. tags.

Once today I felt great, was put on a big detail, watering lawns, the shubbery is mostly evergreens, the natural trees are firs. We had four lengths of garden hose prob. IDO yds. about every third barracks and kooked the hose in the sinks through the window and watered around the building there are about 20 barracks ,the lawns are large, there were six of us two to each set of hoses. After dinner we did it all over again. The grass looks the same as the grass in the swamps and banks along Tom's creek where it is wetest, I saw a little clover scattered and plenty of moss. It must be a swamp grass it sure takes the water. Im surprised there aren't Lilys and water cress. The water is warm it never did get cold to drink.

A McKenzie kild from Arco came, a grandson of our neighbor Eight fellows from Jefferson Co. came All were returned missionaries. If there are 52 weeks to a year I just have 501 left in the first round.

Sunday; Show this pictuer to Al, looks like a real happy character don't you think? You look into a machine, sign reads, Hold still when red light is on, It's like looking into a mirror you see yourself. Then the pictures look like they should be hanging in the Post Office same place, ha,ha. I just finished about five games of ping pang wan four of them. I read a little tract I got in Church last week "Two years in Service can be Profitable" By Pres. Clark. Have another one, What Momens believe' Ray Thompson from Sugar City is giving the Priesthood lesson today. They are serving coffee and doughnuts, the doundnuts are good and the water is not bed. J. Earl is going to Bliss Tex.

I went through I6 Hrs. K.P. today. Some mess halls ere better than others. Some of the cooks-- most of which have a rank of Corp. Sarg. stc.-- are Pretty ignorant, they know that you are here at the R.C. for a short time and they treat

you like slaves, others are nice.

We had a G.I. party today, that is where you scrub the floor with scrubbing brushes, then you sweep them with brooms, then with mops, and then dry mops. Windows, walls, everywhere cant even use the shower untill after inspection Sat. about (9 oclock. One kid had to scrub floor with toothbrush, one had to gig a hole 6x6x6 and put a cigerett butt in andfill in that he through on the ground. love Bernie.

Tues 28 Jul. 1953

Dear Dad; How is every thing in Island Park? Are the Huckleberriesripe? Today we are in Ft.Ord.\* If I were a Gen. the fellows who dont smoke would't have to pick up cigerette stubs.

We left Ft. Lewis by bus, we traveled for about 45 min. At the Seattle Tacoma Olympia airport we boarded a large United Airlines Plane. There were 23 of us and about as many other pasengers, we flew to San Francisco, I did not sit by a window and besides I was just above a wing. I did see the ocean, many high snow caped mountains and the Golden Gate

Bridge. When we got to Los Angeles we flew from there to Monterey on a smaller plane -held about 28 or 30 beside baggage we came into the Fort by bus. Jay West went to Texas, Olson went to Virginia, Harold Ireland and I are here, that's of the four of us who left Idaho Falls togather.

I thought it would be hot here but I have nt seen the sun yet just fog. It has been colder than in Washington, and today we were issued winter clothing, wool jackets, trousers, long underwear, wool caps, and gloves. They say it is as cold as it will get the yeay around here, so I guess it wont be bad if it's never colder than this. At least it will be better for training than it would be if it were hot. Wou have to wear full uniform every where outside of your barracks, that could be warm on a warm day.

I just saw Mr Watt's daughter-in-law, she was an Andrus from Thornton you would know her father, Don Watts, her husband is stationed here I understand. Kenneth Patterson, a missionary from Burley, has been in the same group as I since we were in Washington, and in the same barracks I hope we dont get separated I like him, He's a swell guy. We are the only non -gentiles, or heathens in the barracks. There are really some rough characters here I tell you.

Sat. July 25, 1953,

Dear Dad;

How is everything going? Wellif we could do all the work assigned us here and then do something else we could work two hours and rest ten. There are a lot of kids here who never worked before. You have noticed how people around the mill watch you work. Their eyes nearly pop out, Kids here talk about work ing but they don't know what you mean. If you ever work they watch you like it was something they never saw before.

I got my shipping orders Fri.I will leave for Ft. Ord

Mon. It's near San Francisco.

One day I watered Lawns all day, One kid had a lawn mower for about & hrs., a wheelbarrow would have cut about as much. Swamp grass must be the viriety no lawn grass would grow in so much water, they have moss and toadstools growing in them

funny they dont have waterlilies.

I did real well on my tests , the interrigation officer said I did average on radio and well above average on all the others, He said I can apply for nearly any school which might be open , we can make application in about sox weeks, to pass O.C. S. takes a score of 115 I got II4. I don't care thought If you Pass it you are in the reserve until youare 65 and have to spend two full years after you get through with 9 mo.

or a year of schooling. They put down that I had taken art a and typing. I'll get aome sleep we get up at 4;30, on K.P. it's 3;30 till 7;30, 16 hrs Sun. we sleep Late 5;30 ha,ha,

Mon Aug. 3 1953

Dear Mom .

Well it seems like ages since I have written. I guess I'll finally have a permanent add., at least for 8 weeks, unless I should get a break, it will be 16, we are in a 16 week basic company. A heavy Infantry co. It will be larger guns for foot soldiers, machine guns, bazooks, recoil riffels, etc.

The lights are out early than usual generly 11;30 and we get up about 4;45 or 5;15, its's a long day when you start that early. Tell every one hello, aunt Jenny if you write to her

First four weeks we were quarentined like prisoners. we have about one hour free time scattered over the day, when we must shine shoes mend clothing and do laundry. Our platoon sergesnt is a Negro, There are two LDS twins from St.George but I am not lucky enough to have one. Things should get better that is we will likely loose our quarentine, that depends on how we do things and of the 6 platoons in our M Cooguess we have the worst reputation, that means we get the last choice of everything, we have some smart alecks in our platoon. WE had classes about 6 hours today, we got our MI rifles yesterday. We were marched to church yesterday. L/ It was Sac. Meeting, Eld. Spencer W. Kimball spoke about 8 minutes. Hello to everyone

Dad, dont send my camera we have no way to lockanything.

Tues July 28 '53

How are you? Sunday some of my friends were at church. I met Kenneth Patterson, a returned missionary, from Burley, He's a sweet guy a little taller and heavier tham I. He volunteered at priesthood meeting to talk in church, he certainly gave a wonderful talk. He shopped to Ft. Ord with Harold and I Jay West went to Ft. Bliss Tex.Bet it's hot there. About like Wash, here.

Monday morning we left Ft. Lewis by bus. At seattle Tacoma, Olympia airport we left by large U.S. airliner, there were 22 fellows and a sargent pluss the ordinary passingers 15-25pluss all our baggage. We left 12;15 and were in S.F. about 4;20. The airport at Seattle was larger building than the two I.F.hospital nurses home and Temple combined I guess. We didnt go in it they had other stations where we got our tickets, larger than I.F. Rail Road Depot.Guess S.F. is pretty large, we saw the ocean, the Golden Gate and Say Bridge from the air.WE flew from S.F.to Monterey on a smaller plane it held about 30, we came to the Ft. by army truck.

We came here to the service club to get awet from doing detail, if your around the barracks they get you sleeping, weiting or whatever. The fort is enormous in size, I dont really

know how large for one thing it is built upon rolling hills.

An orchestra is playing it is madeup of G.I.'s who have checked out instruments just to play them. This wasting time goes slow, I went to the barracks, the orderly is a new draftee like myself, he said dont come in go to the P x or Service club or you'll get put on detail. The Service Club was not a open so I sat on the poarch took my Testiment and read most all the First Gospel. After dinner we marched about two miles where we were given clothes, woolen jackets and pants leather gloves and long underwear two caps and infantry button.

After about a month of basic we can put in for schooling I think I will do like Harold plans, he is going to put in for "Training Aids" he sais that has to do with lettering and such. They give you list 2nd 3rd choice. I did well enough on

my tests.

The PX is a large modern store, with everything to sell. Ft. Ord is the size of a city, more compact than a town, not so many vacant lots. Kenny said yesterday when we got on the plane, "Oh, if my mother knew where I was she would just die." He was in Va, and S.C. on his mission and sounds like a southerner Love Bernie.

Mrs. J. W. Knapp 347 Cleveland St. Idaho Falls, Idaho My leave statred on the 20 June. I left at midnight and went to BAd Nauheim where I stayed with the Lunds for the night. Sunday we went to church in Friedberg and after church I took my cameras and my bag and went to Frankfurt

on the train. Then I got a round trip by train toAachen, Germany where I called Henk on the train and he came and picked me up at the "Bahnhof.

I left Fra kfurt at 4:30 and traveled through Mainz, Bonn, Koln, and Koblenz on the way. All of these cities are situated on the Rhine River. All the way along the Rhine River there are high sides many of them are actually cliffs. They look a good dael like so of the hills along the way south of Pocatello. Well anyway all along t ese hilltops at various places there are castles. Some don't have much left and others appear to be kept

up and in ggood shape.

At Machen Henk came and got me and we visited for quite a while then I went and got a hotel room at the Bahnhof hotel across the street from the Bahnhof. The next day Henk came and got me and after we had eaten he took me in the jeep and drove me around Machen for a little while. It was an old city and like most of the cities that I saw along the Rhine had been badly bombed during the war and very little has been done to fix them up again though this may not be true and if so it just goes to show how addy they maust have been right after the war. Well he drove me to the border at the little town of Vaal. I checked in at the customs office there and he cleared the jeep and on we went. Now I was in Hoolland. No more cobble stone highway but a modern one. Henk drove me about 20 or 25 miles into Holland where he put me on the train at Maastrict. The I went on to Amsterdam alone.

I had the address of a hotel where I could get a good room at a reasonable price and after a few minutes walking from the central station in Amsterdam I found a travel agency and they directed me to the Hotel. The manager spoke good English and he was filled up just for that one night so he took me to a friends place who had an opening for that night and then the next day why I went back over to his place. Where I stayed the rest of my stay in Amsteedam which was until I returned home. All took toll it cost me 6 guilders a night. A guilder which amounts to 27 g in our money wasn't too expensive especially since breakfast comes with the hotel room there.

Assterdam is fairly large. It is called the Venice of the North. It has about 60,000 inhabitants and is smaller thatn Salt Lake in area but is built up more in the air as a whole. It has many old buildings with there outmoded steeples. There are over 54 canals and over 400 bridges. Seems like that every block has a bridge. There are many small boats and barges small enough to pass below the bridges and also there are many draw bridges.

on the main canals that allow larger vessels through. +

Tues. I went to my hotel. (The 1st night at the Hiller hotel the elderly couple 1oth spoke English and they talked to me for a while before I went to bed. When the found out that I was not a coffee drinker the woman asked me if I happened to be a Mormon and when I told her then she got out her scarap book and showed me a picture of the Salt Lake Temple on a little article of Faith card and two autographs that she had, so I susposed that she had at one time had some missionaries into her hotel.)

Tues. After taking my bags over the other hotel I decided to find the large Museum. It was called the Rykes Museum. Well I walked quite awhile before I found it and right across from it is the L D S church in the city.

So I wound up going there fi rst and it happened that Mithat day they were holding a district report meeting so I attended upon invitation. The missionaried reported there and it was a very fine meeting and I really enjoyed the testamonies and also hearing what Pres. Van Dâm had to say.

Well I ate with the family there that weree taking care of the church and later on the missionaries had a snack and I ate again with them. They eat bread and butter twice a day in Holland and then the other meal they eat vegetables, especially potaces and spinach. They have s sort of molasses which they eat on their bread along with butter.

Pres Van Dam was a former officer in the Field Artillery and so he had to tell a few of his experiences in the Army since I reminded him of t e army. I took a few pictures after that and wandered around window shopping.

Wed 22 June I went to the station and took a train to the Hague ( Den Haag) which is the city where the mission headquarters is. It is a tremendously large city. It is spread out for acreas and even miles. I walked and walkand never did come to where I could see anything that looked like the edge of town. I rode a street car for it seemed like ten or fifteen minutes just to get to the street where the missin home was located, Laan Von Poot. 292

Well I got there just in time to jo in the missionaries in there dinner meal and as usual it was a bread meal only they were a little fancy and had

jam to put on there bread.

I decided to foollow the street car tracks ack to the station but it wasn't that easy and besides it was farther thatn I had anticipated. But as the city is spread out and not many buildings over 2 or 3 stories high I saw an unusually high tower and decided to see what it was and take a picture of it. It turned out to be the Peace Palace. It was began by a 12 million dollar contribution by Dale Carnegie and then all the countries of the world contributed in the way of building materials such as the tile by Italy and staues by the others countries, paintings and so on I t is lavishly built and decorated and then on completion in 1917 it was the place where the United Wation's Court of International Justice was held . Then during the war it was forced to be abandoned and now the Carnegie library which is on the premise s and is t he largest library on international law in the world a is there and is the place for school in the summer and many universities all over the world send students there for the mid summer coursed. Finally I left here after a tout through the palace and I later took many pictures both inside and out I found my way back to the station.

Then I went on to the Delft. It is noted for its blue dyed china ware I looked up an address there of a missionary. When I found the adress I was invited in and they were just getting ready for to eat but no more bread for me that day. Well they had to leave for a cottage metting so I got back on the train and took of for Rotterdam. By the way this fellow

was Herman Hatch a boy whom I had known at Ricks.

It took about an hour to get there . By 8:00 I found his address and after I found it he was gone to a cottage meeting so I stayed there until they came back. He was really surprised to se me . since he did not know that I was in Germany and so we spent a few hours takking over our days at Ricks The next morning he took me on his big pp/ companion's bike and I fo lowed him. We went all over Rotterdam. We went over to the harbor which is the world's largest inland Port. There we went across. WEll first we got on a huge esculator and went 75 ft or so down then we peddled along thhis tunnel for 5 min. or so and then got on another esculator and came up on the bank opposite to where we had been. I got several pictures of the ships t there and also one of a British aircraft carrier. Then we rode back across and after a while we saw the new part of the city. It has been rebuilt. It had been bombed a great deal mostly because it was a big port. as most of holland wasn't bombed heavily during ithe war.

Then nearly back to Gaylen Beazer's appartment which was in the upstairs of a doctor's office I saw the famous church of the people who came over on the

Mayflower.

At that I left Rotlerdam, and left for the Delft doing some lookg ing at things that iI had seen there previously. At Delft I vesited the old church (Oude Kerk) I took a lot

of picture there and I vent into the tower and climbed to the he loftiest heights. There was a winding stair with an occase nal landing and a do r outside where Their was a railing around the tower so that I got pictures from several altiudes and from any direction I was able to get shots of the city. One that I particularly iked was that of the New church which was just across the street, although it was tall I as high above it. Also I took a pi ture looking up t the big clock on the tower and also the bells in the bel frey. Then coming down I counted the number of steps which was 333 and each of them was an eight inch step. so It was quite a hieght. (Excuse the typing since I am using a strange typewriter and a portable at that.) Prt of the steps a were wooden and part were of stone. Also the steps made a occmplete turn every 10 or 12 feet.

Wed in Den Ha g (The Hague) I visited the Peace Palace. I went into the palace on a tour for 25% and saw it all. All the different things were largely gifts donated by countries of the world. The fountain in the rear Garden was given by Norway. This fountain had four seals and 4 polar bears. It was a tile bowll. It had many rooms some of which I saw. In some were lavish gifts such as a paair of ivory tusks from the King of Siam Yand other things like vases in which there was figures gold-inlaid. A large pure white statue of a lady representing peace -- gift of t e aUS. A statue 1/7 the size of the original Crhrist of the Andes statue which you may have seen in one of the church sections which showed Pres McKay during hes isit to Chile.or Peru. Italy gave much of the tile for the floors. Paintings on the windows and the ceilings of the hallways were done by the Dutch. Rugs for the floors in some of the rooms were by the Dutch also. I didn't have any flash for my camera but I did take some black and white shots with my Rollei.

Lots of sailors in the cities I suppose mostly they were Dutch and some English. Friday be an by going to Aalkmar, North of Amsterdam a ways. It wasn't very impressive however. There was a cheese market there alright and I saw the old dutch workers in there costums carrying the cheese out and loading it onto the boats on the canal in front of the market place.

The weather wasn't very good and I noticed all the Holstein cattle grazing as I went back on the train to Amsterdam. The farms there are different thatn in Germany the farms live on the farms therefore you see the farmhomes. I was that is one reason Holland looked o go d because it is like the farm country I have been used to seeing.

Back at Amsterdam I decided to go to Artis which is the zzoo

Saw an acqari m there all kinds of snakes, turtles and fish of many kinds. Saw a Rhinocerus and other things.

Then I went back to the hotel and after leaving my camera case just took my Rollei along and went down by the station where I took a tour on a boat through the challs. It was a long boat having more seats that in a large bus. It had a glass top and glassed windows. I went out in the harbor and also I saw the Zuider Zee while I was in the harbor and then of curse i saw many ships and the docks of many lines from all over the world. The guide on this tour said; Amsterdam is called the Venice of the North Many buildings are actually built in the water. It has over 200 bridges, over 53 canals and 60,000 inhabitants. I saw its narrowest street on the tour. One way traffic for

pedestrains.

I met Henk the next day at 10:000 WE walked around for a while. We visited the Ruykes museum and saw the old paintings of Rembrandt and old ships, old romms of paintings of former Dutch rulers and miniature ships rangeing from very small models to some 25 feet long or so. L ter on in the day we went to his mother's home She lives in Amst. but on the opposite side of the harbor. The citie is joined by a system of ferry boats wich operate free due the consideration of the city. We had dinner which was bread and butter with a little jam to go with it. After suppe Henk to k me to Haarlem which was where he was born and went to scho Here there is an LDS chapel and it is where he joined the church. The only font is at Amst. but he attended church in Haarlem He showed me the places of historical interst and old churches, castles and the park where he had played while growing up. The park is about 4 acres and has a small herd of deer and some swan and ducks in the canal there. Tehere is a beautiful place in that city where the Queen previously lived.

That evening we attended a movie in Amst it was my lst Cinema scope it was in English with Dutch in printing at the bottom The next day Henk and I visited the Van Alman's who live in the top of the church. She brought Henk into the church and also influenced her husband into joining the church. They are nearly ready to go to the states since he has not obtained his citizenship papers he has to be back in the states within two years so that his mission is a sort one. They have two little daughters. Sunday morning at 1:00 I met Henk at the station and we crossed on the ferry where I went with him and we are dinner at his mother 's

hose. WE had a nice dinner of spinach and potatees and pudding.
That day I braved eating a herring "Haring", which are raw but
pickled fish. But they serve them with plenty of onions and bread
this was the supper which we ate after church. WELL I had Henk
tell his mother good-bye for me and left, meeting him the next
day at 9:30 at the station and we were soon on our way back to
Aachen on the border where Henk is stationed. We were at the border
by 1:00 an ready to go to his place but I stppmed for an hour to
do a little shopping. That night we visited and went to a German
movie which Henk had to explain to me. I stayed in a hotel that
night and the next day Henk came down and saw me off on my train back

Dear Bernie!

Your Christmas card was indeed a pleasant surprise! I had often wondered what you might possibly be doing and where you were. As you've already noticed, I am back in Germany, but not necessarily for Uncle Sam this time! At present I am in my minth month as a missionary and am enjoying it immensely.

I was pleased and also thrilled for you after reading that the "Hong Kong" area would be your home for about the next three years. A mission is difficult work, but the dividends are very high, depending of/ course on the diligence of an individual.

My first field of labor after arriving back in Germany was the quaint old city of Bamberg (Bayern). The city itself is predominantly catholic and even has an archbishop residing there (should say "ruling there!"), but nevertheless has a terrific little branch of devoted members who have a wonderful spirit among them. It was joyous working among them and partaking of their spirit and sharing many things in common with them.

From Bamberg I was transferred to Ddsselderf, a city of some 700,000 and located in the famous Ruhr area which is noted especially for its heavy industry. Ddsselderf is known among missionaries as the Penthouse of the West German Mission! The apartment, located on top floor of branch house is one of the very finest in the land. So for that reason many of the Elders would like to go there. Also for that reason, Pres. Burton told us not to spend too much time in the apartment!

We had an excellent English class with an average attendance of between 150 - 180 each Wednesday evening. Besides regular grammar instruction we had song practice and learned all kinds of American songs. In fact I had an all-girl chorus and we had a great time singing Xmas carols on Xmas Day in a large catholic hospital. As near as we could ascertain, much good will was created.

But of course all good things must come to an end and mine came in the form of a transfer! It was rather hard leaving so many fine friends and a lovely branch, but I am just as pleased with Darmstadt which (we learned a week ago) is the oldest Branch of the Church in Germany. We have more time to do regular missionary work here instead of taking care of branch functions as is necessary in most other cities.

My companion is a very nice boy, 20 years old, from Honeyville, Utah, and has been here just slightly over three months. He didn't know a word of German upon his arrival, so you see that we are kept busy learning the language in our "spare time" which of course is rare! The language is coming along very satisfactorily for me thus far. Should speak it like English before too long (with constant study!).

Well, it's time to go to work so will sign off the air for this time. I certainly hope these few lines find you well and happy. I suspect you're getting anxious and tense about embarking on your new adventure in the Orient! Keep my address and drop me a line from there when you happen to find time. Thanks again for remembering me at Christmas. Give my Best Regards to your Folks. And take good care of yourself.
