Yet it left a little room for doubt in my mind - It at least stuck with me and I had to consider it. I still remember it in an indelible manner.

The same about my driving, not paying attention enough when I drove. Well one can get into the habit of driving with a fixed stare. I used to do it in the Ford truck - for long periods and I guess I did too as well as notice all the houses etc along the road.
